

Lees-McRae Men's Soccer Signs Five

Five student-athletes have signed to attend Lees-McRae College and play men's soccer in the fall of 2013, announced Bobcat head coach Lee Squires

Wednesday. Yago Xavier (Rio de Janeiro, Brazil), Patterson Towles (Angier, N.C.), Avery Varley (Raleigh, N.C.), Daniel Harris (Wilmington, N.C.), and Isauro Estrada (Linville, N.C.) will join the Lees-McRae men's soccer program for the 2013 season.

"I am delighted that we have five talented players already signed and committed that will help us get where we want to go," said Squires. "All five are great student-athletes with lots of potential and welcome additions to the program. I am very hopeful that once we tie up a few loose ends, that we can announce the rest of this year's recruiting class in the coming weeks. With the new players coming in, and the returning players working hard to improve and having more experience, it sets us up well for this fall season."

Yago Xavier – Forward/Midfielder – 5-10 – Resende, Rio de Janeiro, Brazil

Xavier comes to Lees-McRae from Instituto Sao Jose Salesiano in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. The 5-10, 148-pound forward/midfielder is currently enrolled in classes during the spring semester, and is expected to major in international business. Xavier is the son of Xavier and Cláudia Cesar Biajoni, and has one sister, Julia Xavier.

"I chose Lees-McRae because I found in this family an opportunity to grow academically and in soccer, which is my great passion," said Xavier. "I hope to make the most of the opportunity they have given me, and that these years will be the happiest of my life."

"Yago has joined us this spring and has settled in right away as one of the boys," commented Squires. "He has all the ability to make a major impact and improve our attacking threat. He has good speed, fantastic quick feet, works very hard and just loves to play the game. He is an exciting player with a great attitude and appetite for learning."

"Avery was the standout goalkeeper at our summer camp," said Squires. "He has great size and athleticism, and is a very well-rounded goalkeeper and student-athlete. I am looking forward to seeing him develop and take his game to the next level."

Isauro Estrada – Midfielder – 5-5 – Linville, N.C.

Estrada comes to Lees-McRae from nearby Avery County High School, where he was a two-time all-conference performer and a four-time NCHSAA AAA Scholar-Athlete. The 5-5, 135-pound midfielder is also a member of the National Honor Society, as well as an Avery County High School Junior Marshall. Estrada is the son of Lucio Estrada and Lucia Romero, and has two sisters, Iris Rubi and Kimberly Estrada.

"I chose Lees-McRae because it is a school that fits me well," said Estrada. "It is close to home and all the staff are really welcoming. It is a beautiful campus where you learn as a family because you are treated as a student not as a number."

"Isauro is a local talent which is always great to have," said Squires. "Academically he is very bright. He has a sweet left foot and is a very intelligent player that is technically good and uses the ball well, with a low center of gravity that makes him hard to defend against. He is a great addition to our team."

Lees-McRae enjoyed a far better season than its record would indicate in 2012, holding its opponents to two goals or less in all but two matches, including a 1-0 extra time loss to eventual national champion Lynn University in the season-opener.
